Worship in Church - Covid-19 Measures

Current guidance over regular worship in churches remains unchanged and places of worship are still considered to be "Covid-secure venues" so they are exempt from the 6 people limit for services of public worship and private prayer. However, groups inside church should not be more than 6 persons, groups should not combine and there must be social distancing between groups.

Said Communion services will continue to be held on Tuesdays at 9:30 am and on Sundays at 10:00 am (BST). The regular Sunday on-line service on Zoom will continue be held at 11:00 am (BST). Holy Communion will continue to be in one kind only and the 2-metre social distancing requirement will apply. Contact details of those attending will need to be recorded in a suitable notebook and details kept for 3 weeks. When attending worship in church <u>you</u> <u>must continue to wear a face mask within the church building</u> apart from the celebrant, those reading lessons / leading intercessions and during receipt of Holy Communion.

FOCUS ON... HARVEST THANKSGIVING

The annual commemoration of Harvest Festival is both very ancient and worldwide. And, in Britain, the practice of giving thanks for successful harvests can certainly be traced back originally to pagan times. In fact, the word "Harvest" is said to be derived from the ancient Anglo-Saxon word "haverfest" which means "autumn". Later it came to refer to the season for the reaping and gathering of grain and other grown products. For Christians, Harvest celebrations comprise the singing of Harvest hymns, prayers of thanksgiving, the decorating of Churches with the "fruits of the earth", and opportunities for almsgiving for those less fortunate. Alongside food production from the land, our thanksgiving embraces the "harvest of the sea": as we give thanks not least for all those many people who play a role in the provision of our daily food. The topics embraced by Harvest prayers written in modern times have often been expanded to include such matters the "harvest of energy" as well as thanksgiving for the fruits of human labour in all kinds of fields of work and not simply the harvesting and production of food. And, increasingly, Churches have linked Harvest with support and concern for people in the developing world for whom growing crops of sufficient quantity and quality continues to be such a great struggle.

Further and deeper layers of meaning to Harvest Festival in the Christian context make reference to Eucharistic themes, and to the glorious hope of the resurrection. In John Chapter 6, we are told that Jesus described himself as the "bread of life" and as the "living bread that came down from heaven"; and that he attested to the will of the Father in saving that "all who see the Son and believe in him may have eternal life; and I will raise them up on the last day".
