Coming to Faith, Growing in Faith

Week Commencing SUNDAY 14th March 2021 MOTHERING SUNDAY

FOCUS ON... MOTHERING SUNDAY

In our Church calendar the Fourth Sunday of Lent is also known as "Mothering Sunday". In contrast, in the USA, "Mothers Day" takes place on the second Sunday of May. In the early part of the 20th Century an American woman called Anna Jarvis. following the death of her own Mother in 1906, successfully lobbied the President of the USA for a national special day for Mothers. Mothering Sunday in this country has entirely different and much more ancient origins; and celebrates the concept of Mothering in a much wider sense. Originally, in fact, Mothering Sunday referred to the Church, and indirectly to God as Mother of us all. And by long tradition, it has long been a day to think of Mary, the Mother of Jesus. On Mothering Sunday, as a Lenten observance. Christians were required to worship at their "mother" Church. the place of their Baptism. This custom was especially significant at a time when children were sent away to work, perhaps in service, or as maidservants, or as farm labourers. For Mothering Sunday, they were allowed home to spend the day with their families. On their journey home, they would pick wild spring flowers to present to their Mothers. So here we have the origins of the long-standing Church custom of children presenting flowers to their Mothers. In fact, inspired by Anna Jarvis's efforts, Constance Adelaide Smith revived and reinvigorated the observance of Mothering Sunday in this country in 1913 in order to honour "Mother Church, mothers of earthly homes, Mary the mother of Jesus, and Mother Nature". On Mothering Sunday, then, we give thanks for the parental care of a loving God. And we commit ourselves once again to sharing that love with others, within our own circle of family and friends, and beyond. In this we fulfil the Law of Christ: Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength: Love your neighbour as yourself...

England remains in a third National Lockdown. Fresh Guidance issued by the Bishop of Oxford is that it is expected, providing the progressive reduction in lockdown measures over the next few months continues as planned, that there can be a return to in-person public worship in step 3 of the relaxation of lockdown restrictions. THE ST. JOHN'S LENTEN FRONTAL

This Sunday we move clockwise around the Lenten Array Altar Frontal and look at the second group of symbols relating to Jesus' journey to the Cross. This is rather more gruesome than the first, a pair of crossed multi corded whips. If you look carefully, each cord has knots tied in it, which were aimed to make the damage caused by the flogging worse.

The pair of whips is the second of the five groups sequentially in the Passion Storey and relate to when Jesus was brought before Pilate and he offered to release either Jesus or the criminal Barabbas. After the crowd called for Jesus to be crucified, Pilate ordered that Jesus should be flogged before being handed over to be crucified (Mark Ch. 15 VV. 15).
