Coming to Faith, Growing in Faith

FOCUS ON... EASTER JOY

Central to the Easter faith of the church is that the bursting of the tomb which God accomplished in Christ assures us that, no matter how difficult and dark and challenging our own life journey may be at times, our Lord is with us in all things and He promises us new life in Him now and for eternity. At the heart of our Easter faith is hope and trust that God is always there for us. This means that, however, challenging our circumstances, there is a "blessed assurance" that God never deserts us no matter how dark and desperate things may become for us. No wonder. then, that the Gospels testify that the first witnesses to the resurrection of Christ were overwhelmed with joy. Indeed, joy is at the heart of the Christian celebration of Easter. Because the resurrection is the most glorious and significant event imaginable! When we contemplate the deep wonders of the universe, it seems clear that the mystery of God extends well beyond the reach of human comprehension. However, we do know what God is like because he has chosen to reveal himself to us in the person of Jesus Christ. And from the teaching and example of Jesus we learn that the nature of God is self-giving, self-emptying, self-sacrificial love. One of the most profound moments in the Gospel Passion narratives occurs when the Roman centurion recognises Jesus to be the "Son of God". It is key to understanding this episode that we recognise that this dawn of revelation occurs precisely at the moment that Jesus has died. But the message of Easter joy is that this is not the end of the story. The Gospels go on to testify that this death was a gateway to a new beginning; and that this promise of new life and new hope is for everyone. This is at the heart of the joyful Gospel message which we are called to proclaim as followers of Jesus Christ. So it is with joy beyond measure that we celebrate the "Good News" of our Easter faith. Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

THE ST. JOHN'S LENTEN FRONTAL

Although Lent and Holy Week have passed, this Sunday we move to the bottom left-hand corner of the Lenten Array Altar frontal and consider the fifth and final group of symbols relating to Jesus' journey to the Cross; a ladder, a spear and what looks like a ball on the end of a pole. The grouping represents events after Jesus was crucified. The ball on a pole is the sponge on the end of a reed / hyssop branch which was soaked in sour wine and offered to Jesus after he said he was thirsty (Mark Ch. 15 VV. 28 – 30). The spear was used to pierce the side of Our Lord by the soldiers to confirm that he had died. The ladder would have been used to take Jesus down from the Cross (Mark Ch. 15 VV. 33 - 37). With today being Easter Day the Lenten Array, which was taken down at the end of the Maundy Thursday service, has been put away for another year and replaced by our Easter frontal showing the Risen Lord with his hands outstretched in greeting (see above).

The St. John's Easter Garden which has been created in the churchyard near the West Door. This is part of a series of nine such gardens in an Easter Trail which has been put together by Churches Together in Risborough (CTR) which are loosely based on the Stations of the Cross. The St. John's garden is No. 7 in the trail and represents Jesus being stripped of his garments, with his robe hanging on the Cross.
