
FOCUS ON... ST. ANTONY OF EGYPT

Saint Antony the Great was born near Memphis in Egypt around the year 251. He is very widely regarded as the exemplar of the desert eremitic tradition. His story was brought to prominence in the "Life of Saint Antony" written around 360 by Saint Athanasius of Alexandria. This biography of Antony's life helped to spread the concept of Christian monasticism, particularly in Western Europe via its Latin translations. It was around the age of 20 in the year 270, that Antony received the call to the monastic life just a few months after the death of his parents. He was prompted by Matthew 19:21 "If you want to be perfect, go, sell what you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasures in heaven." And so, after ensuring that due provision was made for his sister, he gave away his wealth and withdrew to the desert to live a life of prayerful solitude and rigorous asceticism, said to be especially marked by battles and struggles with demons in the guest for "purity of heart". Although there were a number of Christian ascetics before him. Antony was among the first known to go into the wilderness. Accounts of Antony enduring supernatural temptation during his sojourn in the Eastern Desert of Eavot inspired the depiction of his temptations in visual art and literature. As a Saint, Antony is appealed to against infectious diseases, particularly skin diseases. In the past, many of these afflictions including ergotism, erysipelas, and shingles, were referred to as "Saint Antony's fire". In time, a number of disciples gathered around him and so he is widely regarded as the founder of Christian monasticism. Antony is known to have travelled to Alexandria in the year 311 in order to support Christians facing persecution but his deeper longings led him to leave his "Outer Mountain" for an even more remote desert area further east towards the Sinai peninsular, where he took up abode in a cave on Mount Kolzim. He died there on 17th January in the year 356.
