FOCUS ON ... THE MAGI

In his Gospel narrative, Saint Matthew emphasises the kingship of Christ. In the Second Chapter of his Gospel account, he tells of Wise Men from the East who bring gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh for the infant King. Matthew also tells us of the encounter of the Magi with King Herod the Great, a despot and puppet ruler in the service of the Roman Empire. The historical testimony is that Herod was responsible for successfully carrying out a number of significant building projects including the reconstruction and extension of the Temple at Jerusalem. But history also records him to have been a wicked ruler who was married ten times, killed his favourite wife Mariamne, and murdered three of his own sons. Matthew's Gospel tells us that Herod was so fearful of the infant Jesus that he ordered the execution of all children in Bethlehem aged under two in an unsuccessful attempt to eliminate the holy child. This Gospel event is known as "The Holy Innocents", a commemoration which the Western Church observes each 28th December. The gifts of the Wise Men symbolise three key aspects of Christ's identity - gold representing his kingship, frankincense as a symbol of his priestly role, myrrh as a symbol of his prophetic role and a prefiguring of his sacrificial death and embalming. The three gifts of the Magi are also said to express their offering of love, truth and service to Jesus. According to Western Church tradition, the names of the Magi are Balthazar who is often represented as a King of Arabia or sometimes Ethiopia, Melchior as a King of Persia, and Caspar as a King of India. In Christian art from the 14th century onwards, Caspar has often been depicted as an old man. Melchior as a middle-aged man. and Balthazar as a young man. Though travelling together, and possibly from an area of ancient Babylon or Persia where the principal religion at that time was Zoroastrianism, their differing ethnicities are said to identify them as representative of the human race as a whole.
